Building Space Available

On Campus – 650 South Salina Street, Syracuse NY 13202

4,991 SF on the first floor of the southern section of the Dr. Sarah Loguen Center. This space is currently not renovated.

Electronics Parkway, Liverpool, NY 13088

Building 3: Electronics Building Park

100,000 SF of vacant building space in the former “Laboratory” building of the General Electric Industrial Complex.

505 Irving Avenue, Syracuse NY 13210

580 SF of vacant space within the University’s Institute for Human Performance (IHP)

20,000 SF of vacant space within the second floor within the University’s Institute for Human Performance (IHP).

1,221 SF of vacant space within the third floor of the IHP.

841 East Fayette Street, Syracuse NY 13210

4,400 SF in the form of ½ of the second floor of the CNY Biotechnology Accelerator Center.

10,000 SF in the form of the third floor of the CNY Biotechnology Accelerator Center.

Land Available

Downtown Campus – 800-1000 East Water Street, Syracuse NY 13212

9 acres located ¼ mile north of the downtown campus. Land is owned by Upstate Properties Development, Inc. Currently open land.

3.86 acres of land surrounds the Bio-Technology Research Center. Owned by Upstate Medical University

Community Campus – 1400 Broad Road, Syracuse NY 13215

2 acres of land associated with the Community General Campus. The area is open land and the location of an idle boiler house that is to be demolished.
